

HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM


Increased uptake of SRHR services including Family planning & integrated HIV & AIDS prevention.

Family Planning: Overall FP total reach: 175,327

ACODEV provided family planning and SRH services to women and adolescents through collaborative efforts with public health facilities via outreaches and at static level; the training of Village health teams and Young Peer Providers based in communities created high demand among targeted populations to access and utilize the FP services.



community based resource persons and, **33,849** clients served through facility supported outreaches and at static levels. A range of Family planning services was provided to women and adolescents; the highest FP commodity accessed in the year was Male condoms which was attributed to ACODEV community health education approach through trained resource persons equipped with FP commodities. Other FP services provided included Depo, Sayana press, implanon, Jadelle among others.




Through awareness creation & referrals, a total direct reach of 133,791 youth & OVC with integrated HIV prevention information was attained; annually, 83,607 condoms were supplied to the youth specifically as a safer sex measure against HIV & AIDS & other STIs; additionally, 5,319 clients were counseled by our trained resource persons,

referred them for STI testing and treatment; ACODEV supported health facilities to conduct outreaches on HCT which resulted into a direct total reach of **102,941** clients tested and received HIV status reports; Out of the **3,949** HIV Positive clients, 98% **(3,869)** were enrolled for ART.

OVC Care and Support

ACODEV has been working to support Orphans and Vulnerable children and their caregivers in areas of Income generation, formal education for the children/OVCs and responding to their health issues especially HIV & AIDS & psychosocial support. In the year 2018, ACODEV trained 27 VHTs to support OVCs better in their health challenges & psychosocial support, this in addition helped OVC households in improving their sanitation and hygiene plans; VHTs have also consistently monitored the HIV situations of OVCs and Caregivers with the ability to create a linkage between health facilities and the HIV Positive OVCs & care givers for ART services.


Our OVC & Caregiver total reach!



A total of 495 OVCs and caregivers were directly reached & supported; among them, ACODEV provided 260 Orphans and vulnerable children with scholastic materials to help them access formal education; 20 girls who joined secondary education were supported with schools fees for 1st -3rd terms respectively. We also built capacities of 235 **OVC** Care givers in Income generation activities like backyard gardening to boost nutrition of the HIV Positive OVCs under their care, among them, 85

In 2018, a total of 60 OVC youth (38 female 22 male) actively engaged in learning the available skills.

At least 15 OVC Teens have mastered the game of producing these and many more.

At the ACODEV vocational center, OVC youth were taken through a process of how to drain water from soaked cotton husks as part of the initial stages of training in Mushroom growing.


The Sustainable Outcomes for Children and Youth (SOCY) is one of the interventions which ACODEV registered more of its achievements while supporting OVCs, youth and their caregivers with economic empowerment and facilitating them access core services including health, education and psychosocial wellbeing of OVCs, as well as reduce abuse, exploitation and neglect.




In 2018, SOCY intervention successfully reached 46,504 beneficiaries, representing 85% reach against its Country Operation Plan (COP) target. Among these 43% (19,985/46,504)were adults compared to

Achievements Vs Target 2018




The intervention provided economic services, food and nutrition, health services, child protection and psychosocial support to 59%, 63%,75%, 26% and 95% respectively to the beneficiaries as illustrated in the figure below.



The formation of SILC groups in communities is one of the approaches which **ACODEV** under the SOCY intervention has promoted to create economic empowerment OVC among caregivers and youth through personal savings and access to available credit to help them actualize personal development including creating businesses, supporting Orphaned gain education among others.



In 2018, the intervention through ACODEV supported formation of **550** new SILC groups against a target of **622** representing 88% achievement. The total membership in the SILC groups was **12,302** against a target of **14,302** representing 86% achievement.




The current value of SILC groups' savings




One of the youth groups formed using the SILC methodology, by the end of 2018, member had saved a total of 12,246,000 Uganda Shillings. The greatest impact of these youth savings have helped them start viable and meaningful individual income generating activities including vegetable growing, tomatoes, onions among others where youth have undertaken diversification of income activities to help the growth of their development plans. Picture above shows SILC youth members engaging in tomato growing as an alternative source of income from their savings.

Cumulative savings and outstanding loans



Total savings amounting to UGX 870,595,350 and a loan portfolio sta 720,575,898 was registered by 2018. The cumulative loan count was 611 reported investing money borrowed and/or shared to generate more meeting family basic needs including food, clothing, education, healthcare.



Number of youth trained in Vocational skills

Under the SOCY intervention, a number of youth successfully finalized vocational courses including Entrepreneurship , financial literacy, Aflateen among others. a total of **1239** male & 1302 female youth were trained.

Success Story

Margaret Nakabula is a 17-year-old daughter of Erismus Alude of Kitaswa Village, Kasera parish, Kamira subcounty, Luwero District. After dropping out of school in 2015, she lost hope of acquiring any skill that could help her earn a living in the future. "As I continued sitting at home, life became too hard and my parents didn't have a stable income",




She was lucky to have an artisan who mentored her well in tailoring skills. Her parents were so excited seeing their daughter complete the training and being in position to operate a tailoring machine, no doubt in January 2018, her father after selling the groundnuts and beans harvested from their garden, bought for her the tailoring machine at UGX 350,000 She then started working at home where she currently makes at least UGX 30,000 in a month; This money currently helps her meet her basic needs. She has now joined a youth saving group with a purpose of saving to rent a room in the trading center where she can do her business more comfortably and able to tap into more available customers



ACODEV's MNCH interventions have enhanced delivery of evidence-based Maternal Newborn and Child approaches to reduce mortality and morbidity. As a result of these

efforts, ACODEV has continued to contribute towards building functional healthcare system that is currently delivering quality healthcare services.

In 2018, ACODEV worked with health facilities in Luwero district to build capacity of Health Workers to provide quality Maternal services including health education of women at community level to utilize facility based MNCH services especially ANC and Delivery whose outcome is to reduce chances of delays in labor contributing to fighting the occurrence of Fistula among women; Clinical upgrade such as equipping Health Facilities with the essential maternal and newborn equipment to promote safe deliveries; skilling Health Managers in effective Leadership and Management practices meant to strengthen quality of service; Mentoring and Coaching of health workers on MNCH care standard protocols (in Emergency Obstetrics, Family Planning, Helping Babies Breath (HBB), Maternal Infant Nutrition among others); Facilitated Health facilities support supervision by the DHTs; conducting MNCH service audits including death audits.




ACODEV registered an increase in the number of mothers utilizing Antenatal Care Services from 2017 at 9105 mothers to 12834 mothers in 2018.

The increase in number of mothers accessing ANC services was attributed to ACODEV's approach of investing in clinical equipments that offered a safer delivery environment for deliveries; these among others included - BP Machines, Ambu-bags, bulb syringes, solar systems in the MNCH departments; trained Health Workers (midwives/nurses/clinical officers) implementing MNCH Package (Resuscitation and Antibiotics prescription), BEmOC and FP skills.



Health facility based deliveries





In 2018, ACODEV contributed to an increase in the number of health facility-based deliveries compared to 2017 - For example Luwero HCIV had **2,228** deliveries in 2017 and **4,677** deliveries in 2018 due to a number of processes including training MCH staff in leadership and development for health managers, trainings in Emergency Obstetrics, HBB, equipping MCH departments with solar lights among others (For more info on Numbers, see chart above).
